



THE GENERAL ELECTIONS.

On Sunday February 5th 1939, another biannual general election of the Maitland Junior Zionist Society will take place. This will give the chairman the opportunity, on behalf of his committee, to take members to task for whatever weaknesses have been discovered during the past six months. It is to be hoped that the general body of the Society will reciprocate by criticising the administrators during the past session for their defects which

undoubtealy do call for comment.

During the past half year meetings were held very irregularly. What was the cause? It is only logical to see in this some connection with the poor attendances at committee mestings, a list of which is published elsewhere. We accuse the committee of nonchalance, but do not exonerate ordinary members from the some crime. They elected this committee in spits of a fair knowledge of each member's capabilities. They either suffered from a lapse of memory at the time or were indifferent as to who managed their affairs - the latter is most probably the case. Let us now learn from the past rather than brood over its failings. Members will then realise the extent to which they control their own destinies and will use their voting power only after careful consideration.

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RELIEF AND NATIONAL FUNDS.

In the wake of the ever-increasing refugee problem numerous relief funds have been inaug-The liberal peoples of the world, including practically every Jew who still lives according to civilized codes, have, out of sheer humanitarianism contributed to these funds. Unfortunately humanitarianism is closely interwoven with sentiment, which has always been a softener of hearts. As a result donations are made to relief funds which in comparison to contributions to our national funds are entirely out of proportion. Let us not allow untold misery to drown our reasoning powers. National Funds, constituted by the Keren Hayesod and the J.N.F. represent monies used towards the permanent solution of the Jewish Problem. Relief Funds on the other hand only offer temporary relief from the prevailing distress and consequently must be treated in the light of a temporary measure.

We do not for a moment wish to belittle the good work done by the relief funds, nor do we doubt that the money is very urgently required, but National Funds bear the stamp of permanency and therefore are of major importance. Continue to donate to all funds but lay the emphasis on National Funds when doing

VALUE OF JEWISH EESTIVALS.

Every healthy and prosperous nation has its festivals and times of rejoicing and thanksgiving. As most of the people are farmers or tillers of the soil these festivals are intimately connected with their life and occupation. The festivities have usually some agricultural or pastoral significance, such as the ripening and reaping of the crops, etc. Even so is it with the Jews. In the land of their ancestors



they lived as a healthy and happy people, even as they again will after the Return from the Exile.

The first mention of such festivals is made in the Torah. It refers constantly to the Exodus, and the Liberation of the Israelites. How intimate is the connection between this historical event and the

first awakening of the plants, the commencement of Spring. Side by side with the religious, historical and moral observance of the Feast of Passover is the rejoicing and welcoming of Spring. New life and hope is imbued into us not only by the optimism of the Seder and the hopefulness of Elijah's Cup, but also by the freshness and strength of the young plants and flocks.

Coincident with the Giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, of the Law on which Jewish life was to be based and of the first sign of a great nation, is the rejoicing of the first fruits and ewes on Shevuoth. Great are the festivities of the Jews in Eretz Israel during the Festival when all the first crops are brought to the city and distributed amongst



the poor.

The Torah mentions still a third festival, Succoth. Whereas Peisach is the beginning of the agricultural season, and

Shevuoth, the ripening of the first fruits, so Succept is the gathering in of the flocks and the crops. Eight days are spent in "huts" of palms, flowers and pine to commemorate the passing of the farming season and al-

the Israelites in the wilderness. On the ninth day, Simchas Torah we celebrate the conclusion of the Pentateuch and rejoice in the reading

of "Bereishit" again.

Then we are concerned as individuals. Poor and rich, great and small for all are equal on the Day of Judgment and the Day of Antonement. These are purely religious holidays and bear no significance to the agricultural life of the people. The Ten Days of Penitence are a solemn season of retrospection. On Yom Kippur as on the last days of Pelsach, Shavuoth and Succoth, a special prayer, "Yiskor", is held

in memory of the Departed.

Turim and Chanukah are two festivals with an historical background not mentioned in the Torah. The former signifies the economic and political plight of the Jews in Persia, the cruel persecutions, great sacrifices and ultimate liberation. How symbolical is this not of the recurring anti-Semitic outbursts and the programme of racial and religious persecutions conducted against the Jews all over the world. Purim is celebrated by carnivals, masquerades, etc.

Of greater significance, however, is Chanukah. As it is connected with the homeland and is more religious it has been taken up in-

to Jewish Life much more than It re-Purim. calls the heroic stand of the Maccabees against the Roman invaders, the erection of an independent state, the cleansing and sanctification of the Temple once more to the service of God.

In Palestine, the Festivals are bound up with the soil and bind the nation to it. Great is the welcoming of Spring, the rejoicing of the first fruits and the planting of the trees, and the thanksgiving for the harvest. So, in the Diaspora also, each festival has its particular significance and manner of observance, its peculiarities of food and delicacies, atmosphere, etc., which lend more interest to them.

In the Galuth, however, the Festivals take on a different aspect. The agricultural significance cannot be so strongly felt, and the religious side is thus more strictly observed. The synagogue, during festival time, is the



house of Prayer and Assembly for the nation. The Sounding of the Shofar rallies the Jews, exhorts them to stand together and thus to survive the anti-Semitic persecutions. The very atmosphere becomes more Jewish, the home more homely and a new spirit and hope is born.
