REVISIONIST PROPAGANDA EXPOSED.

Before the opening of the Palestine Conference, Dr. Weizman - President of the Jewish Agency - in a letter to the London Times, supported the case for increased Jewish immigration into Eretz Yisrael. This paper commented editorially upon the letter stating that immigration should be within certain limits. The corres pondent of a South African group of newspapers cabled the text of both the letter and the editorial, and in printing the news "The Cape Argus" erroneously attributed the views of the editorial to Dr. Weizman.

In spite of the fact that the mistake was so obvious, the Revisionist Organ - "The Jewish Herald" - reprinted the error; but stated that the news was from its "own" London correspondent and added that English Zionists were "deeply shocked". A local Jewish paper Subsequently pointed out the error and "The Herald" admitted it. However instead of apologising to Dr. Weizman for crediting him with a most un-Zionist-like statement it tries to cover up its own fabrications with another attack on him.

The "Jewish Herald" does not explain (1) Why, since "The Herald" is published in Jo-Jannesburg did it reprint obvious incorrect news from the "Cape Argus" when the identical statement appeared correctly in the Johannesburg "Star"? (2) Why did it falsely publish it as a cable from its London correspondent? (3) Why were English Zionists stated to be "shocked" by the letter when they had never seen the "letter" in "The Cape Argus" or the "Jewish Herald"?


On Sunday morning February 5th a J.N.F. clearance took place. The amount realised to date is over £5.

TEL HAI.

On the fourteenth day of Adar, 5680, corresponding to the 1st March, 1920, the following made the supreme sacrifice while defending the Jewish colony of Tel Hai against an Arab attack:--

JOSEPH TRUMPELDOR. SARAH CHIZICK. DEBORAH DRACHLER. SHNEUR SHAPOSNICK. AARON SHER. TOKER. BENJAMIN MUNTER. SHARF.

Owing to some diplomatic quibble the Upper Galilee in which Tel Hai is situated was evacuated by the French and English troops and was immediately invaded by several thousands of well-armed Bedouins, ready for murder and pillage. Soon the inhabitants of Tel Hai could see only two smouldering heaps on the spo where shortly before had stood a neighbouring settlement. Captain Joseph Trumpeldor and his companions were entreated to evacuate Tel

Hai. In spite of the fact that the French troops with all their artillery had been unable to resist the Arab onslaught, the settlers decided, at a hastily convened meeting, to defend the soil on which they stood against overwhelming odds and refused to retire to the neighbouring settlement of Metulla for safety.

There were only twenty five men in Tel Hai and they had but eighteen rifles between them. For each rifle a thousand cartridges were wanted or at least five hundred, yet they only had one hundred for each rifle. For ten days, rifle in hand, girls and men fought side by side for and on the land of Israel, saving for the Jewish People a stretch of territory which would otherwise have been lost.


CORRESPONDENTS WANTED.
