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KEREN HAYESOD 1940.

The 1940 Keren Hayesod campaign will be opened in Cape Town early this month.

It is this fund which is primarily responsible for the transformation in twenty years of a desert into a living national structure. Due to its work of restoration in Eretz Yisrael a new country has been created from desert and swamps. Year by year has the structure of this country grown; new settlements, towns, electricity, the first industries, the rebirth of Hebrew, new folk ways, schools, song, music and the stage. For the first time in 2,000 years Jews have returned to a normal pattern of life, agriculture and industry, trade and science, learning and art. All this is due to the work of the Keren Hayesod.

The last few years have been a terrific strain on Eretz Yisrael. Disturbances amounting to Civil War have tried the whole structure of the Yishuv. Men and women resisted attack and went on building. Great achievements like the construction of the Tel Aviv port and fifty new settlements was Jewry's answer to these disturbances. Furthermore since 1933 Eretz Tisrael has become a home for many thousands of refugees, a home which means work and freedom. This great effort of salvaging a distressed nation would not have been possible without the Keren Hayesod.

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It is apt to quote from General Smuts' stirring message to the opening banquet held recently in Johannesburg:- "There is a danger that the war may cause a falling off of funds at a time when they are more than ever necessary, not only to carry on the great work but also to provide for the settlement of refugees from many parts of Central Europe.... There is no fear that the present appeal to Zionists will go unheeded. There is no more generous community in South Africa or in all the world and South African Zionists have established a record of support for their cause which is the envy of the world".

When shortly you will be asked to make your contribution to the campaign think of the amazing achievements of the Keren Hayesod and do not forget that the measure of Eretz Yisrael's success in saving Jewry depends upon the support you are prepared to give to the Keren Hayesod.

PESACH.

Many of us are familiar with the observance of Pesach. Some of us too are aware that it commemorates the exodus of the Israelites from Egypt. But few of us realise the great historical significance of this festival.

The Torah every now and then, for an obtious reason, recalls the exodus from Egypt. The experiences of the Israelites were to be an tample and so important a lesson to us that we tontinually had to be reminded of it.

It is the Matzo which still conveys this Matzo - "the bread of

haste" - tells of the upreparedness of our brethren in Egypt and is a warning against that great failing of the Jews. We have throughout the ages not been prepared to take full advantage of any sudden opportunity which time and again has presented itself. The Balfour Declaration is merely one example which would not have become a scrap of paper had we been ready to accept it in 1917.

Side by side with this physical readiness comes the spiritual acceptance of freedom and nationhood. Forty years the Israelites were destined to wander in the desert so that a new generation might be imbued with the ideals of the Torah, and be educated to bear the responsibilities of nationhood.

The opportunity to regain our freedom may come at any unexpected moment. Let us heed the writing on the wall which Pesach so clearly amplifies. Let us take good care that we may not once again be caught both physically and spiritually unprepared for our redemption.

Though members do not attend these meetings regularly they sometimes come in drowds. An enjoyable evening was spent by all on Tuesday 9th April.


On Tuesday the 16th April the Society team defeated the strong table tennis team of the Maitland Young Israel Society by 13-12.
