NOT TO BE WORN UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.



It is announced that the South African Zionist Youth Council has responded to the appeal made by the Union Department of Defence, to the effect that organisations which are able to carry on without the use of

badges or tokens should refrain from using them and not apply for exemption under the regulations.

Members of the Zionist Youth Movement have accordingly been instructed not to wear badges, blazers or blazer badges until further notice. NOTE.

The instruction does not necessarily apply in the case of <u>Habonim Uniforms</u>. We understand that Habonim are asking for exemption of their uniforms which play an important role in their organisation and can really be regarded as indispensable.

After the serving of refreshments, the Hall was cleared for dancing and the meeting dispersed at 11.p.m.



On the day of the las' general elections the Blue Boxes were cleared. This was the first time that Milnerton was also done and the total collection reached the high figure of £7.5.4. No amount collected during the last few sessions ever neared this total.
