Maraisburg Recollections – the Schneiders

My grandfather, **Lewis Schneider** was born in Pasvetin, Lithuania on 15 September 1876 (according to what we were told). He must have arrived in South Africa in the late 1800s and was known as a Rand



Pioneer. He later **made his way to Maraisburg**, being attracted by the burgeoning gold mining industry in the area (Durban Roodepoort Deep and Rand Leases) and there he established a general dealership under the name of Schneider's Groceries and Provisions on Main Reef Road.

Around 1904, he met the beautiful Gertie Katz who was also born in Pasvetin apparently, on 15 February 1889. The couple were engaged on 23 December 1906 and their engagement notice appeared in the first Christmas edition of the newly established Sunday Times on this very same date. (A copy of this page with engagement announcement is featured at the end of the article.) The engagement notice under the heading "Fiancailles" (an old fashioned way of announcing a betrothal based on a French word) stated "KATZ-SCHNEIDER The engagement is

announced of Miss Gertie Katz, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. Katz of 3 Ferreira Street Johannesburg to Mr Lewis Schneider of Maraisburg."

I recall my grandmother Gertie telling me that Lewis Schneider was a 'very frisky man' and wealthy to boot as he bought her a piano which was then an expensive and uncommon household item. The couple married in Johannesburg on 23 June 1907 at the Johannesburg

The newly-weds set up residence in a semidetached house at **10a Sixth avenue Maraisburg**– the home where all five of their children were born

– see this photograph taken in 1998 prior to my migration to Australia.

By 1913, **Lewis Schneider** had built his own premises for his store in a building with a headstone stating 'L Schneider's BDG' with the date '1913' above the name. The building was situated on the main thoroughfare running through Johannesburg to the mining areas appropriately named Main Reef Road.



I last visited the building in 1998 when the building housed a paint and hardware store. The name of the building was still clearly visible – **see photo below**. In the changing South Africa, Main Reef Road became Albertina Sisulu Road and looking at a google earth photo in March 2021, the building is now painted a bright red and houses Darryl's Motor Engineering and a fast-food chicken outlet. The headstone with the building name and date is still in place and the address is shown as 2285 Albertina Sisulu Road. At the same time, I also checked the two homes that my grandparents had owned on google earth and found that the home on **Arthur Matthews Avenue** was clearly identifiable but the home on **Sixth Avenue** looked very different although some features of the original semi were still in place.

Maraisburg Shul and Jewish Community




My grandfather, Lewis Schneider was active with the Hebrew Order of David, Dr Herzl Lodge No 1.

He was a stalwart of the Maraisburg Jewish community being instrumental in the establishment of the Maraisburg Shul. He was the Trustee who secured the land and his name and title appear on the foundation stone laid on 26 June 1921. The small

congregation of nearby Florida also worshipped at the synagogue in Maraisburg. The Maraisburg Synagogue was described as being an intimate site of prayer with a closely knit congregation. In the 1960s the congregation amalgamated with its larger close neighbour in Roodepoort, bringing

new life for the dwindling congregations.

I am familiar also with some of the other names on the foundation stone namely H. Woolf, S. Krawitz and S Y Sandler. My family have had a special and longstanding relationship with the Krawitz family going back to my grandparent's time. Their eldest son Abe, who became a prominent solicitor in Johannesburg, proposed the toast to my grandparents Lewis and Gertie Schneider at my parents, Max Schneider and Vida (née Milunsky)'s wedding in Johannesburg on 27 December 1950.

My grandparents Lewis and Gertie Schneider had five children: Rose, Bessie, Sarah (Sokkie) Jack and lastly my father Max.

The eldest child Rose married Hymie Massey from Pretoria where they lived with their two children, Rhona and Brian Massey. Rhona, being one of my older cousins, has many memories of our grandparents and there is a photograph here of her and Neville Klein, the son of neighbours of my grandparents with the delivery bicycle belonging to Schneider's Groceries and Provisions. Rhona recalls that our grandparents assisted many newcomers from Lithuania with board and lodging. She



also recalls them hosting many a Shabbat Kiddush for the community at the larger home to which they had moved – 8 Arthur Matthews Avenue, Maraisburg. Rhona also remembers that our grandparents were the first to replace the old outside bucket toilet with a proper flushing toilet inside the house and that the Mayor of Maraisburg came to consecrate this new addition to the Schneider home.

However, back to the semi on 6th Avenue where after Rose came **Bessie.** Aunty Bessie married a wonderful, community oriented businessman, **Morris Hertz** who was the founder of the Valley Observatory Hebrew Congregation in Johannesburg. Bessie and Morris had three children, **Marlene Krowitz, Max Hertz** and **Ilona Wides**. In my childhood, virtually all of our family attended the Valley Observatory Shul where uncle Morris served as the chairman and later president for virtually all of the Shul's existence. I had my Barmitzvah there on 9 July 1966

Aunty Sokkie married Solly Krawitz, a GP in Johannesburg. (Solly's brothers were Abe, Barney



(who was an accountant) and Les who owned a children's clothing factory) Solly and Sokkie Krawitz were well-known lawn bowls champions in Johannesburg and beyond.

Sokkie and Solly Krawitz had two children, Marion and Steven. Marion sadly passed away in February 2021 – the first of my first cousins to die, and it was a very sore loss for me as Marion and I had been very close growing up in adjoining streets in Highlands North and

I used to visit her and the rest of the family in South Africa every year until Covid put paid to that. Steven – Hebrew name Shmuel after his paternal grandfather, Samuel - and I spent many happy hours in our childhood playing soccer and cricket in the Krawitz's back yard as well as amazing games such as Balyna cricket and Escalado horse-racing game.

My uncle **Jack Schneider** was an accountant. He married **Rhoda Jankelowitz** who came from Benoni. They had two children, **Mark and Loren** both of whom live in Sydney and I am very grateful to have first cousins here. Sadly, uncle Jack died at an early age. Aunty Rhoda later came to live in Sydney as well and it was very special for me to have a surrogate mother here. See photo of Jack, Robert & Max Schneider

I mentioned earlier that my late father, Max – the younger son of **Lewis and Gertie Schneider** married my mother **Vida Milunsky** in December 1950. Max being the youngest in his family was able to relate very well to his sister's children and they all have fond memories of him in Maraisburg playing with him in the garden of the house in Arthur Matthews Avenue. I have copies of some lovely letters they wrote to him and also their voice tributes to Max and Vida when they got married – most of the nieces were either bridesmaids or flower girls at the wedding.

I have a recording of the speeches from their wedding and Abe spoke glowingly about my grandparents and their contribution to Jewish life in Maraisburg including the fact that every Rosh Hashana, they opened their home for a brocha to the whole Jewish community of Maraisburg. Later on, Abe's younger brother, Max had his barmitzvah on 28 January 1939 in the **Maraisburg Shul**. The next day, Lewis and Gertie hosted a reception which was attended by the Mayor of Maraisburg, Councillor Van Zyl and his wife. The photo below includes all the Schneider children, their spouses (for those who were married) and Mrs **Sarah Woolf**, the wife of **Harry Woolf** who was also on the Shul committee.

The relationship between the Schneider's and the Woolf's must have been quite close because I recall as a child schlepping with my parents to Maraisburg for the Barmitzvah of **Barney and Ada Woolf's son. Barney** who was the eldest son of Harry and Sarah was also involved in the winding up of the Maraisburg Shul. In a strange quirk of fate, I am very friendly here in Sydney with Harry and Sarah's grandson **Hilton Woolf**, the son of their youngest son, Stanley. The Woolf's had two other sons, **Isaac and Ernest Woolf**.

Another name on the Shul foundation stone that I am familiar with is that of Sandler. I recall in later years that **Elias Sandler** used to visit my Granny Gertie once she and my grandfather Lewis had moved to Johannesburg. Elias Sandler (after whom Sandler Road in Fairmount/Glenhazel is named) was also involved in the establishment of the Johannesburg township known as Percelia. I also recall the Zidel family – **Sam Zidel** had a real estate agency opposite Schneider's Groceries & Provisions. Sam Zidel's grandsons **Jeff** and **Ian Zidel** still live in Johannesburg and Jeff is still involved in real estate including developments in Maraisburg.

Another prominent son of Maraisburg was **Dr A (Jock) Beron** who, although born in Roodepoort, moved to Maraisburg before becoming the principal of King David Primary School in Linksfield. My late father Max was very friendly with Dr Beron – I myself was a student at King David School

 and I daresay that this friendship may have had something to do with Max becoming deeply involved as the chairman of the King David Schools Management Committee and an executive member of the S A Board of Jewish Education.

My father Max was very community minded – something he perhaps inherited from his father Lewis – and aside from Jewish education, Max was the president of the local chapter of Lions International, and both he and his older brother Jack were actively involved with what was referred to as the 'Young People's Committee' of the then Witwatersrand Jewish Aged Home (WJAH).

My father Max Schneider's Memories of Maraisburg



My father told me how he and his siblings used to help my grandfather Lewis in the shop. One of the highlights of his childhood was the arrival each year of Pagel's Circus to the town and that Mrs Pagel was famous for not giving the correct change when you bought a ticket to the show.

Max loved his nieces and nephews, and they loved him. They all have fond memories of playing with him in the garden at **8 Arthur Matthews Avenue**. (left). Rhona told me that my father Max used to love to take them to the circus and also to the cinema in Roodepoort.

My father adored his dog, a collie named Peter, and often told me how smart this dog was as it always sensed which train Max was coming home on from Johannesburg where he was studying pharmacy. This alerted his mother, Gertie so that she would know that he would soon be entering their home. Rhona told me that it was quite amazing how they would all be sitting in the garden and suddenly Peter would disappear crossing many roads and passing through the subway beneath the railway line to get to the station where he would be waiting for Max when he got off the train.

Sadly, the dog Peter was run over when a drunkard kicked him, and he ran into the street. Rhona tells me that Max was absolutely heartbroken.

In the early 1950's my **grandparents moved from Maraisburg to Johannesburg** living at 176 Tenth Avenue Highlands North. I was born in 1953 and my grandfather Lewis passed away in 1959 so I have only scant memories of him as a white-haired old man who used to love to sit on the veranda of their home and that he always had a khaki handkerchief. I am told that as the first Schneider grandson, my grandfather was quite besotted with me. I remember his study and that on his desk, he had a rubber stamp stand that contained a number of different stamps. He used to stamp all his books "L Schneider" and I must have inherited this trait because as a child, I had my own rubber stamp with my name 'R P Schneider'. I inherited the iron stamp stand and when I migrated to Australia, I gave it to my cousin Brian Massey.

One event of my childhood involving Lewis and Gertie Schneider stands out for me and that was celebrating their Golden Wedding in June 1957 in the garden of my beloved aunty Bessie and uncle Morris's garden at 5 Doorn Street Observatory.



In the picture of this event we see all my grandparent's five children, their spouses and children and there in the centre standing between my beloved grandparents stand I, Robert Schneider, the first of the next generation to carry the name Schneider

My grandfather Lewis Schneider passed away in June 1959. I recall going with my parents to visit him at the Lady Dudley in his last days. I was extremely attached to my granny Gertie and when we moved to 148 Tenth avenue Highlands North, it was very easy for me to go and visit her daily. She was a beautiful woman in her younger days and in her mature years, she maintained this beauty and a dignity and grace that made her the queen of our family until she passed away in January 1973.

Robert Schneider - my life

My own desire to serve the community continued this tradition as later I joined the Executive Committee of the Witwatersrand Jewish Aged Home – the youngest member I might add – and also served on the chaplaincy, publications and country communities committees of the SA Jewish Board of Deputies.



I have always loved nature and wildlife and in the 1970's became actively involved with the Endangered Wildlife
Trust later becoming the only Jewish Trustee. I was also a Trustee of the Rhino & Elephant Foundation, Lapalala Wilderness School, the Wilderness Trust, the African Raptor Information Centre and the founder of the South African Friends of the

Israel Nature Reserves Authority and chairman of Project Noah's Ark – a project to conserve Israel's endangered biblical species. I am also a Life Member of the Wildlife and Environment Society of Southern Africa and the Endangered Wildlife Trust. Interestingly, the official launch of the African Raptor Information Centre took place in the Roodepoort Botanical Gardens (now known as The Walter Sisulu National Botanic Garden) (picture above) in the presence of the then MP for the area and then Minister of Finance, Barend Du Plessis whose nickname was Barend die Arend (arend being the Afrikaans for "eagle.")



On the educational front, I served on the board of Northview High School as well as being vice chairman of its foundation. I was also a member of the Herman Charles Bosman Literary Society and was involved with the actor and raconteur, Patrick Mynhardt in staging some Herman Charles Bosman events in the Groot Marico. On migrating to Australia in 1999, I became the CEO of the Jewish National Fund of Australia for 14 years (photo) followed by a 5 year stint as the Development Director of the Sydney Jewish Museum. At the time of writing, I currently serve as the CEO of the Australian Friends of the Hebrew University and the honorary representative in Australia of the Israel Nature & Parks Authority.
