A little while ago Stanley Loon who 'drives' the site received the link to a short 7-minute family movie that the Levy family in Bellville had made in 1959 and chose to share with us all. CHOL is truly grateful for the clip prepared by the late Hazel and Leslie Levy and forwarded to us by their daughter, Shelly who lives in the States!

The subject of the well-planned video captures a day in the Hebrew Nursery School in the centre of the town, set up by the community, where children between ages three and six, spent their formative years. We're talking about the Apartheid era when our choices as citizens were limited in so many ways. All the children attending came from the various neighbourhoods in the town which then had 100 Jewish families and a population of 40,000. (our Geography teacher taught us just how many there were in Std 3!) Till today, many ex-Bellvillites, Jewish or not, recall meeting friends daily in an environment that was both stimulating and lots of fun.

One can't help but smile watching the children in the movie, many of whom we still have contact with 66 years later!! They are spread all over the world, from Australia to Canada, Israel and South Africa. And yes, in the digital world in which we live, these once cute children pulling carts, spinning on wheels and climbing jungle gyms, received an email link to the movie. Giggles, oohs and aahs, came back via return mail and the smiles and amazement could be felt threading their way through our often dull and repetitive email accounts.

The star of the clip was undoubtedly Betty Frumer (Kagan) the young Nursery School Teacher in her early twenties, who drove every morning from Kuilsriver, the neighbouring town, to Bellville with her two children, Lynette and Janine. Betty, who grew up in Muizenberg, married to Benny, a GP, was freshly out of the Barkly House Training School for nursery schoolteachers. She embarked enthusiastically on her new appointment in the community,running the youngest class.

After receiving the movie, I set about tracing Betty's family so that they too could share the joy of discovering a snippet of life then, showing Betty at the beginning of her very varied career. The Frumers had settled in Israel in 1962, their lives centring around Ashkelon, a coastal city in the south of the country. After the usual 'do you know' and asking around, I found a phone number for the business that the family ran.

Two weeks ago, I phoned.

'Hello, I wonder if you could help me. I'm looking for the Frumer family....'

'I see, who is this please?'

'My name is Gail and I'm from Tel Aviv. I have a special short movie of Betty that I'd like to forward to her family...Maybe you could tell me how to contact them?

'This is Betty!! was the reply.

'Really?? that's amazing!' I mumbled.

And so Betty and I chatted for ages on the phone about people we both knew, her time at the Nursery School, the children and their families. She shared her age of 93 with me and said she felt like 70 and that she'd love to meet up. Of course, she remembered Stanley, my younger brother, who was her pupil in the kindergarten and was thrilled that he'd be joining us.

She was prepared to travel up to Tel Aviv by train and meet. Her schedule was pretty full, but we managed to set a date and so yesterday that's exactly what we did!

We met for coffee 66 years later, reminisced endlessly exchanging experiences, each telling the other about our lives, the ups and downs, the choices we made. It was simply wonderful. And then right at the end, her grandson Edo together with the partner of her grand-daughter, arrived on the scene to meet with Betty and Bini, her helper. They were thrilled to watch the movie of Betty checking ears, smiling in the playground, making sure the children were safe and happy.
