On a personal level, it's been truly wonderful 'meeting' so many new people from San Francisco to Melbourne, from the Gaza Strip in Israel to Ceres in the Cape! The stunning achievements in so many different fields growing up in South Africa, spreading these far and wide.

And yes, realizing as I progress along my retirement and have more time to think, countless issues that weren't really discussed or dealt with by the community and which left many feeling isolated and alone. Here, I refer to dealing with health problems, both physical and psychological which were often terrifyingly real and needed outside support which wasn't there. There were members of the community who suffered pain and tremendous heartache which needed to be managed without professional or official community assistance and support and left its mark forever. I am sure that we all knew and remember the tough stories of abortion in unmarried women, financial difficulties that members went through, family issues that divided homes so painfully...

And yes, there are several stories on our website telling about these periods in our lives which you are invited to read.

Before mentioning some of the stories, I'd like to share with you that 3 members of our Share Your Stories group met with Sally Crankshaw, a lecturer from UCT, for a wonderful creative writing workshop which not only connected us, but encouraged us to sit down with a sharpened pencil and actually write!

So, now to mention only some of the lovely stories from **5785** on our site https://chol.website/stories.htm (page 7)


- ✓ **Linda Kantor's** Renata's piano which tells the journey that the family's grand piano made from Rhodos to Cape Town
